Catherine Gray 19th June 1944 – 30th December 2019



At the end of December 2019 Branch members were shocked and saddened to learn of the death in hospital in Edinburgh of Cate (Kate) Gray, very shortly after she and Alex had moved north. We send our condolences to Alex, James and Jamie, Alison and Sean, Alasdair and Katie, and all the grandchildren.

From Graham Tough:

Kate grew up in the village of Boldon near Sunderland. On leaving school she went to study pharmacy in Sunderland and later in Glasgow. It was during this time that she met Alex. They were married on December 27th 1969. After three years in Newcastle, in September 1972 they moved to Cardiff.

In the 1970s there were several evening classes in SCD held each week under the auspices of the local authority. In late 1981 Kate saw an opportunity to set up an evening class in the then expanding suburb of Radyr. This continued there for several years until local authority cut backs and rising rents forced a move of the class to the Scout Hall in Whitchurch, where it still runs today. There have been two dances composed in acknowledgement of this class: *The Radyr Dancers* (devised by Alex himself) and *Radyr Welcome* (by David Queen).

Whilst negotiating to start the dance class Kate was asked if she would take an evening cookery class. Despite having no formal qualification in this area, not being one to miss a challenge, Kate agreed. As she said, mixing chemicals for pills and mixing ingredients for cakes – they only differ in magnitude!

In addition to SCD Kate also taught Scottish Step-Dancing during the weekly

Highland class which Alex had set up. Kate was also a keen singer and set about learning *puirt a beul* (Gaelic mouth music). She would often sing for the dancers performing the Sword Dance, Highland Fling, etc. (though she would acknowledge that she didn't understand the words of the tunes, which in any event can often sound silly in translation).

Kate was mother to daughter Alison and two sons James and Alasdair. They were all brought up in a home immersed in SCD. James in particular inherited Kate's aptitude for music and has, in his own right, become a well-known, and well-travelled, musician in the SCD world.

As already stated, Kate liked a challenge, so in the 1980's she took up playing the clarsach. Her dedication to this eventually led to her becoming Convenor of The Clarsach Society.

Kate and Alex were married for a few days over 50 years. Unfortunately, the circumstances of their Golden Wedding Anniversary were heart-rendingly sad.

From Jim Proudfoot:

Kate was a generous lady - not just in the material sense but with her time, her expertise and her enthusiasm. She would find time to help anyone she could, who had shared interests. We met, through dancing of course, a few years after she and Alex moved to Cardiff. Jan knew Alex through the Branch committee and it wasn't long before we were travelling to Cardiff to attend the Thursday night Highland Class.

In those days, Kate's time was largely taken up looking after their three young children, yet she could still find time to accommodate visiting teachers and bands for day schools, balls and the then new Branch event, the summer Festival. We

have many memories of travelling on the old A48 (the M4 hadn't penetrated as far west as Swansea in those days!) trying to keep trifles and flans intact, our contribution to the band's lunch, as the jelly started to melt in the morning sun!



Our family enjoyed regular hospitality at Coryton Crescent, particularly after the monthly Sunday afternoon Family Class and Kate and I would would debate, long after the children should have been in bed, putting the world (and the RSCDS!) to rights. Kate had firm views on most things; fortunately for me, it wasn't necessary always to agree with them!

We also enjoyed a number of trips to dance festivals with Kate and Alex, organised by the Thursday class. Not only did these provide the experience of participating in some excellent dance displays (genuine 3rd party reviews - honest!) but also the numerous social events that go along with such visits, both organised and ad hoc, en route! Kate was competitive in many ways - the family referred to it in their eulogies as "liking a challenge". I'm told that on one such trip, I think, to Rheine, she and I engaged in a schnaps-drinking competition - I have to say, I have no recollection of the event!

In more recent years, as our own growing family commitments prevented us from travelling, particularly mid-week, our close involvement waned - others will recall their experiences from these times. But the friendship between the families endures - Should auld acquaintance be forgot?



From Isabel Hitchman:

'Straighten your lines – heads up – shoulders back – tummies in – toes turned out' – were Kate Gray's often-repeated words in her Cardiff Tuesday class. They were said as she put its members through technique practice, with her constant emphasis on footwork, covering, phrasing, giving of hands, looking at one's partner, and (that wonderful thing) flight.

Her own dancing inspired by example. Kate demonstrated, beautifully, what she insisted on; her strathspey steps, in particular, were exquisite. Watching her, one understood exactly what to aim for and how it should be done.

Inspire she did. A sizeable core of students followed her, over thirty-plus years of the class, from Radyr Comprehensive School (after the Head decided its dingy spaces could be put to other uses on Tuesday evenings) to Whitchurch Scout Hall (which had a sprung floor; the Gray family had a voice in Cardiff Scouts).

In its early years, Kate's class was a family affair. Kate's stepmother, Dorothy, had been the accompanist for Anthea Dalziel's Cardiff class, the precursor of Kate's. She continued playing for Kate, with the

teenage James standing in and finally accompanying regularly until he went to university. Alison's participation was celebrated by members dancing 'Miss Alison Rhona', written by Alex for his daughter. Alasdair was by far the youngest member of the class.

Throughout the decades from the 1980s, Kate kept together the medallists, the RSCDS aspirant teachers, and the oncea-week enjoyment seekers. All would be represented in the South Wales Branch outdoor summer Annual Festival. Eventually, the aspirants qualified and took over more and more of the teaching. Kate kept her hand in, for several years editing the programme for the class's annual June dance. Two years ago, the class demonstrated a dance devised by Alex for Kate's Radyr dancers in a farewell event organised by the South Wales Branch of the RSCDS to thank and say goodbye to the Grays, then about to move to a new house near Edinburgh.

It is a considerable tribute to Kate that the class today continues to flourish. The present teachers inherited a longstanding and enthusiastic group welcoming the new members finding their way to it. It is one of Kate's many legacies to dancing.
